over 65 with symptoms. The test is only for people who have **symptoms** of coronavirus – whether that's an individual, or someone they live with. The mobile drive-through testing service is located at Merton Meadow car park in Hereford until 7 May for those who have pre-booked on the government website. Recycling centres

I have raised the on going closure of the recycling centres and can report that due to the shift in the Government advice Herefordshire Council will be implementing plans for increasing access to the recycling centres. We realise that this has been a difficult aspect of the lock down for residents and thank you for your patience. I am pleased to say that there has not been an increase in fly tipping (although there has been fly tipping) over this period so well done everyone for coping so magnificently.

Flooding

One of the reasons that Herefordshire Council was able to be so agile in its response to the virus was that all the emergency co-ordinators were already working on the flooding that so impacted the county. I will continue to monitor the situation and am more than happy to receive individual updates from those who suffered in the floods. I have recently been appointed to the position of vice chair of the Lugg Internal Drainage Board which oversees and carries out drainage in the defined area of the board. I hope that this will increase my knowledge of flooding and land drainage. It will also sit well alongside my role as chair of the Nutrient Management Board which

is working to bring the Lugg into favourable conservation status by reducing the level of phosphate in the water. Land drainage is part of this picture.

We are also planning to build a number of constructed integrated wetlands to reduce the P at the outfall of the smaller sewage treatment works in the catchment. This should not only benefit the water quality of the river but also increase bio diversity and provide opportunities for carbon sequestration. The decision to proceed with the first 6 is imminent. Without such measures the housebuilding industry in the Lugg catchment is at a halt which is having a devastating impact on companies in the area.

The NHS 'Help us to help you' campaign

The NHS is asking councillors to help raise awareness of a new campaign to encourage the public to seek the urgent care and treatment they need. New findings show that four in ten people are too concerned about being a burden on the NHS at this time to seek help from their GP, while data suggests that A&E attendance so far in April has been about 50 per cent lower than this time last year.

The campaign – including digital adverts, posters and social media featuring NHS staff – aims to reassure the public that it is safe to access urgent and emergency services for stroke, heart attack, and other killer conditions, as well as scheduled appointments, vaccinations and maternity services.

Herefordshire Council / Covid 19 response – a summary

Prior to the Lockdown on 24th March considerable work had already been done across the country on preparing for the emergency. A National Plan - Project Shield identifies the most vulnerable in each community with an intention to protect and ensure support is available to them as well as the rest of the community. Early on it was important to establish local lead contacts who could co ordinate volunteers and help in identifying vulnerable residents who came forward from the 80,000 letters from Herefordshire Council and Parish correspondence.

Each Herefordshire Council ward is allocated an officer and assistant who reports to the council, who are the identified lead authority for our area reporting to Govt. This then gives a line of communication in both directions feeding information, concerns and ensuring support to vulnerable and branded as Talk Community in our county. Those who are identified as most vulnerable approx 5,000 are receiving a phone call from officers to double check. A management Board of officers headed by the Chief Executive Alistair Neil oversees the project.

Herefordshire has to date received over £11 million from the Government in two instalments to meet initial extra costs of the virus. It is early days to know the financial implications but I expect more funding will follow. Herefordshire Council has redeployed 200 members of staff, with home working for all staff apart from front line – no staff have been furlonged. Liaison with Wye Valley Trust (Hereford Hospital) and residential care sector is important as the council is also the commissioner of social care. The County Hospital released capacity with many other services e.g cancer care transferred to the Nuffield. The Council has and is procuring additional care provision for hospital discharges by entering into agreements with local hotel chains.

Locally to date figures of infections and mortalities have been much lower than our neighbouring authorities apart from Powys. The concern now must be to maintain vigilance by ALL the public to prevent an increase in outbreaks in our county now and when the unlock begins. <u>The enemy was well defined 75 years ago this time it is invisible, potentially deadly and can be brought to our community at any time.</u>

The provision of personal protection equipment (PPE) has been a major problem particularly sourcing products of the correct standard of protection. There is a currently an international demand with the production in the recent past of all these products chiefly manufactured in the far east. While the focus has always been on the NHS frontline the home care and residential care sector have always been lagging behind. The demands are huge with the Herefordshire (non NHS) care requirements going from no use six weeks ago to over 18,000 per day. The Council has identified various sources of supply and although it remains a significant challenge we are managing to meet the need at the moment.

In other departments vigilance is required for vulnerable adults and children in certain domestic settings; 62 of our 92 schools are in some way open being attend by many but numbers should be higher, some attendees include children in local authority care or protection. Enforcement teams are working with police on lockdown issues and fly tipping.

An additional £62 million has been allocated to Herefordshire from the Government to support local business with various rate relief grants including hospitality and Leisure grants . Currently £45.5 million has been paid out to just under 4,000 Herefordshire companies. There has been a good take up but can I urge any businesses in the ward that pay business rates please to ensure they get and apply for the grant they are entitled to - details on smallbusinessgrants@herefordshire.gov.uk

Penrhos Spirits Lyonshall

In a bit of uplifting news and showing the agility and willingness to adapt of Herefordshire businesses...

Penrhos Spirits from Lyonshall have been producing gin from their distillery based on their farm since December 2018 using the fruit from their orchards as their main ingredient. The future looked bright and the end of March saw their gins released in 25 bars across London under the Drake and Morgan brand.

The untimely intervention of Covid - 19 meant all the plans that were in place had to be postponed and although sales have not completely dried up they were severely affected. With an abundance of alcohol the obvious route seemed to be to make a hand sanitizer. HMRC have a very stringent set of rules to follow but these were relaxed and a formula from the World Health Organisation was published to give guidance on the recipe.

Penrhos work very closely with Celtic Marches Cider. The two companies got together to produce a hand sanitizer called Two Cousins which is available in 1 litre bottles. If you would like further details please contact them on 01544231467.



HEREFORDSHIRE POPULATION PRESSURES

This diagram I think really gives the background to many of the economic, health and social pressures in the UK and Herefordshire today.

The central spine has separated males and females and each horizontal bar represents a year and the number of Herefordians in the county of that age. The blue line is the England & Wales average.

The orange mass is the Herefordshire population and you can see clearly that the bulk of our population is from 45 to 70 years. It clearly shows the peaks of the post war baby boomers and the

1960s boomers and how they are rapidly approaching retirement. In Herefordshire case the mature sections are higher than the national average and below 40 years they are lower.

This diagram tells us nothing new but I think the graphic is powerful. It shows the pressures that are here and coming on our health services, why we need to bring in workers to support businessess, the pinch point at 20 shows the lack of higher education, lowering birth rates and what that means for local schools, and the need to sustain and attract more younger people to provide a balanced economy, support education and provide the appropriate levels of support to the maturing generation.

<u>Symptoms and</u> what to do
